Fields (columns) in the GACD Project Library

Field (column) in GACD Project Library	Description and options		
Project ID + title	This is the allocated GACD project ID and full project title.		
Research Programme	This is the umbrella GACD Research Programme under which you were funded.		
Funding agency	This is the GACD Associate Member who is the formal funding agency. Some projects may be co-funded by more than one funding agency.		
Project website	If you have told us about your project website, it will appear here.		
Start year	This is the year your project officially started. Note: projects are ordered by start year, from most recent.		
End year	This is the year your project ended or the year it is estimated to end.		
Countries (implementation)	These are the countries in which your project is being implemented.		
Countries (admin)	These are the countries from which your project is administrated.		
Aims	These are the core aims your project seeks to achieve.		
Target population	This is the population your project targets.		
Evidence-based intervention	This is the evidence-based intervention that your project seeks to implement.		
Non-communicable disease	This is the NCD which your project seeks to address. Some projects may have more than one target NCD, or not have a specific target NCD.		
CVD_WHO intvn	These are WHO-recommended interventions for cardiovascular diseases being implemented by your project, if any.	GACD is interested in determining where projects align with the recommended interventions in the WHO Global NCD Action Plan. The list of interventions for each disease area is taken from the Updated Appendix 3 of the WHO Global NCD action plan 2013–2030 and the WHO Menu of Cost Effective Interventions for Mental Health.

Capacity development	These are the activities undertaken within your project team to develop implementation research capacity. Note: The full list is in the annex for reference and is derived from past annual project updates.	
Engaging with pol proc	This indicates if your project team engaged with policymakers or sought to influence the local or national policy process. Examples might include a local or national health forum, an international steering group on health, or working with your local WHO office.	
Engaging with pol proc – timing	When engagement with policymakers took place.	
Engaging with pol proc – details	These are examples of how your team has engaged with the policy process in relation to your GACD project. For example, how you engaged with policymakers, who you engaged with, and details of any specific activities (e.g., when they took place, the aims, and outcomes).	
Project impact	This indicates the impact of the project to date and is in the form of a checklist.	
Project impact – details	This reports the details of how the project generated impact.	These fields are included in the Impact Update Form sent to projects that have completed.
Big picture message	This is a succinct 'big picture message' from the project. For example, a significant change in policy or practice because of your project, the most interesting findings, a significant advance in the field to which you have contributed, or something else.	

Navigating the GACD Project Library


The GACD Project Library is hosted on Airtable, which functions a bit like an interactive spreadsheet. A few of the helpful functions are shown below.

↑ You do not need to log in or sign up to Airtable to view the GACD Project Library.


⚠ The GACD Project Library is **view only**.



The rows are records, and each record is an individual GACD projects (red). The columns are different fields of content (yellow), such as the year the project started or countries in which it is operating.



Hovering your cursor over the far left of a record will show a circular icon with two arrows. Click on this to expand the record and see all information pertaining to one GACD project.




The main function buttons are across the top ribbon:




Applying any of these functions is fully reversible and will only be seen by you.

- **1. Search** for specific terms across the whole GACD Project Library.
- **2.** Hide fields (columns) you are not interested in by moving the toggles.



3. Filter what you see based on different fields and terms.





- **4. Group** the records based on different criteria. For example, by Research Programme or Funding agency.
- **5. Sort** the records based on a specified field. For example, the start year of all projects.
- **6.** Decide how much information you see for each project by adjusting the row height.
